Please take the opportunity to reflect on each week's gospel text and the applicable questions. Between the men's study group, the Bible studies both here and at the SCC campus, and the evening confirmation class, Wednesdays have become a great day of learning!

I was contacted by the synod attorney a couple months ago and there are new mandatory revisions to our constitution that were made at the Churchwide Synod gathering over the summer. I've made copies of the revision and put them on the ledge in the lobby for your consideration. We will need to gather as a congregation to discuss the revisions (if needed) and ratify them into effect. Hopefully this can be done after Sunday service sometime this month.

Keep in mind that I will be gone for the synod's fall theological conference in Kearney from 10/17-10/19. We will close off the month celebrating Reformation Sunday (10/30) with another joint service with the Soap Creek congregation. I have been asked to give the message at Soap Creek so service will be held there at 10:15 a.m. Subsequently, our communion service will bump up to 10/23.

May the Lord continue to bless our shared ministry this month!

Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

August 17, 2016

I. Call to order

Chairperson Brian Nelson called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on August 17, 2016. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Duane Wollenburg, Brian Nelson, Jane Stokebrand, Lois Wattjes, Joel Kaelin, and Randy Wollenburg. Jesse Gronemeier, and Adam Wollenburg.

II. Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was presented. It was moved by Lois and seconded by Adam that the minutes be approved as amended. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of \$18,029.59 There was a motion by Randy and a second by Jesse that the report be approved. The motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance is \$36,794.40.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report.
- e) Memorial Report: Balance of Memorial Fund to date is \$20,517.83.
- f) Suggestion Box: None submitted
- g) Committee Reports:
 - Social Committee reported plans for a Tailgate party to be held at the Tri County football game August 26th.
 - 2. Worship Committee reported an updated schedule for music to begin this fall. The schedule is as follows: the first Sunday of the month will feature the Praise Choir; second Sunday will be Bell Choir; third Sunday will be Adult Choir, fourth Sunday will be Children's choir with no Children's Sermon that day, and if there is a fifth Sunday it will be Adult Choir.
 - 3. Parish Education and Youth Group Ministries reported that enough Sunday School teachers have volunteered to provide four groups of classes with two teachers per class. The combined classes are as follows: Preschool and Kindergarten; first, second and third; fourth, fifth and sixth; seventh and eighth. High school students are invited to assist in the Sunday School program. Confirmation orientation will be held September 7, 2016 with confirmation classes beginning September 14, 2016. Sunday School will resume on September 11, 2016. After discussion, council members decided to implement a regularly scheduled meeting of the Sunday School committee to be held the third Sunday of the month at 8:30 A.M. The first meeting will be September 18, 2016.
 - 4. Property Committee reported that the bathroom walls in the parsonage are yet to be completed.

III. Old Business

- a) The God's Work, Our Hands project will be held on September 11, 2016 in cooperation with Holy Cross of Beatrice and American Lutheran of Filley churches. The project will be the "Teen Challenge" program. Representatives of that group will provide a temple talk to detail the program and explain needs.
- b) Following discussion, there was a motion by Duane and a second by Randy to allow the Worship Committee to purchase an electronic piano not to exceed \$ 3,300. That will be funded by the Memorial Fund.

IV. New Business

- (a) Following discussion regarding the installation of speakers in the chapel it was decided to investigate options for that project.
- (b) There was further discussion regarding siding for the unattached garage on the parsonage property, as well as, upkeep on the bricks on the sign in front of the church. The property committee will investigate those issues and report to the council.
- (c) Pastor Koos reported on the first Call Theological Conference to be held September 20th and 21st at Camp Carol Joy Holling. He also reported on the Synod Conference Meeting to be held at Kearney on October 17th through the 19th.
- (d) Other new business included items found in the storage shed to include a Lectern from the old church as well as the Triune Symbol.

Adjournment: There was a motion by Joel and a second by Adam to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. In conclusion of the meeting, Pastor Koos led the group in praying the Lord's Prayer.

The next council meeting will be held on September 21st at 8:00 P.M. Communion Assistant for August is Duane Wollenburg.

Bible study questions Wednesday 8:30-9:30 a.m. October 2016

October 5 (Luke 17:11-19)

- 1. Where is Samaria in relation to Galilee and Jerusalem? (Check the back of you Bible for a map)
- 2. When had Jesus met with the lepers? Why were the lepers on the outskirt of the city (Number 5:2-3)? What do you think that this meant for their economic situation?
- 3. According to Old Testament law what were lepers required to do (Leviticus 13:45-46)? What would this have meant for their relationships with their family? Friends? Anyone? In what state of health do you think they would have been? In what state of cleanliness?
- 4. Have you ever been in a similar position as the lepers? How so? Have you ever ostracized someone? How are we to treat people who have been placed outside the norms of society (Luke 14:13; Galatians 2:10; James 2:5-6)?
- 5. How is the manner with which Jesus healed the lepers similar to our Christian walk (James 2:14-17)? Read Hebrews 11:1. How did the lepers practice this? When have you ever had to take a step of faith? What did that look like? What does following Christ in faith normally mean (Romans 12:1)?
- 6. What was it that the lepers had to do when Jesus told them to go to the temple? What did they say that showed their readiness to obey before even being asked? How might God be calling your family to take a step of faith together?
- 7. What does this passage teach us about a truly thankful heart? What is the Samaritan recognizing when he comes back to Jesus? What is an area of your life where you need to recognize God's work in your life? Are you grateful for the blessings of God?
- 8. How do you look at ungratefulness? Is their anything that you find yourself ungrateful about? Read Philippians 4:6-7. Why is it so necessary for us to be thankful in everything that we do? Why should we be thankful in all our circumstances?
- 9. Why is it hard to be grateful sometimes? How do our own preferences and expectations cause us to have an attitude of ungratefulness?

- 5. Why would it be acceptable for the Pharisee to talk about himself in this way? How do you think God feels about the Pharisee?
- 6. How would you feel about what the tax collector was saying? How do you think God feels about the tax collector?
- 7. When people talk about coming to church or accepting Jesus what do you think they expect of you?
- 8. Have you imagined God would never love you because of something you did in the past?
