Our youth are hoping to share God's love to the Native American community at the Pine Ridge reservation of South Dakota in June. They need our help funding the trip though so please consider giving a special donation on Easter morning.

Two exciting additions to our ministry this month that you might want to take advantage of. There are a couple more (Saturday evening services and Vacation Bible School) that are still being planned but should be formed by next month so stay tuned. In the meantime, rejoice in our resurrected Lord as a testimony to how much God loves us!

Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

January 25, 2017

I. Call to order

Chairperson Duane Wollenburg called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on January 25, 2017. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Duane Wollenburg, Lois Wattjes, Joel Kaelin, Jesse Gronemeyer, Brian Scherling, Yvonne Rahe, Byron Beerenstrauch, Cody Wollenburg, and Amy Stokebrand

Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was read. There was a correction made that due to a vacated position, the council added a one year position to council. It was moved by Brian and seconded by Jesse that the minutes be approved with the correction. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of \$21,763.13 as of December 31, 2016. Joel made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Yvonne. Motion carried. Lois made a motion to officially call the paid treasurer position, which is held by Jenn Uher, the Finance Secretary. Cody seconded and the motion was carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance is \$37,263 as of December 31, 2016.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report.
- e) Memorial Report: The memorial balance is reported to be \$17,454.31 as of December 31, 2016
- f) Suggestion Box: None submitted
- g) Committee Reports:
 - 1. Social Committee (Jesse) reported the Lincoln Stars hockey game will be January 28th.
 - 2. Worship Committee (Yvonne) had no report.
 - 3. Parish Education (Joel) reported completion of the Children's Christmas Program which was rescheduled to December 21st due to inclement weather.
 - 4. Property Committee (Brian) reported that there are 2 items not finished yet. The garage will be sided in the spring. We will need to find a new company to do the job of the sign in front of the church. Windows for the parsonage was brought up that we may need to look into that for the future. Brian may need help with the snow removal.
 - 5. Youth Group Committee (Cody) had no report.
 - 6. A new committee will be the Evangelism committee and Lois has volunteered to head that up.

II. Old Business

- a) A discussion was held about the online giving option thru Thrivent. Thrivent offers a program where people can have a set amount automatically deducted monthly for their offering. The council thought this would be a good program to look into and Pastor will find out more details and bring to the next meeting.
- b) Siding the Garage. Brian will look into this project in the spring and what needs to be done to get this completed.
- c) Jesse made a motion to move \$6,250 from the Anniversary Fund to the Disaster Relief Fund. Lois seconded and the motion was carried.

III. New Business

- (a) The Council decided on Communion Assistants for the year.
- (b) Yvonne made a motion to approve Damrow's membership transfer out. Brian seconded and the motion was carried.
- (c) Byron made a motion to approve the budgeted pay rate for Pastor and the Custodians. Joel seconded and the motion carried.
- (d) A discussion was held to work on a job description for the church secretary and the custodians so those positions would know what is expected of them.
- (e) Joel made a motion to approve the monthly benevolence transfer at \$917 each month. Jesse seconded and the motion carried.
- (f) Barb Nelson will be resigning as Church Secretary so the council will be accepting resumes for the new position by Feb. 12th. Anyone interested should contact Pastor or Duane.
- (g) We received a total of \$235 from the confirmation class out of \$440 for the registration fees for the Middle School Gathering they attended in Grand Island.
- (h) A discussion was held about water softener salt reimbursement for the parsonage. Yvonne made a motion and Jesse seconded to continue to pay for the salt usage. Motion carried.
- (i) The 500th Anniversary of Reformation will be at the end of October. It was discussed it would be nice to do a special celebration. Pastor will look into what may be done.
- (j) Pastor reported that there will be more revisions with the constitution that are mandatory so he will be working on that.
- (k) Pastor requested to attend the Rural Ministries Conference March 5-7th in Iowa. This conference would go towards continuing education hours. Yvonne made a motion to approve and Cody seconded. Motion carried.

Adjournment: There was a motion by Brian and a second by Byron to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. In conclusion of the meeting, Pastor Koos led the group in praying the Lord's Prayer.

Bible Study Questions Wednesdays, 8:30 a.m. April 2017

04/05/17 Matthew 27:11-54

- 1. What does the cross mean to you? How would you describe the Cross of Christ to a nonChristian?
- 2. Read Matthew 27:11-14. Why do you think Jesus had no reply for His accusers?
- 3. What question does Jesus answer?
- 4. Why is Pilate reluctant to authorize the crucifixion?
- 5. Who accepts responsibility for Jesus' death?
- 6. Barabbas was a notorious murderer. The crowd insisted that Barabbas be released and Jesus crucified. Why do you think this was so? Hint: Matthew 27:20
- 7. We read about the soldiers mocking Jesus in verses 27-31. Do we sometimes "mock" Jesus by the way we live or act during the week?
- 8. Enumerate the things the soldiers do to Jesus. What signs show that God is at work in the crucifixion?
- 9. Take a few moments to think about the crucifixion. Does it inspire more discipline in spiritual growth?
- 10. What have you thought about doing recently to grow spiritually but haven't done yet?

04/12/17 Matthew 28:1-10 (Easter)

- 1. Why did Mary Magdalene & the other Mary "(go) to see the tomb" early in the morning? What were they expecting to see?
- 2. Why do you think only the women came early to the tomb? What emotions do you think they were feeling as they walked? How would you have felt if you were with them?
- 3. The Scriptures are clear that the women were at the tomb early, and the men were not. Should the men have been there? Why or why not? Would you have been at the tomb early? Why or why not?
- 4. What is the significance of the earthquake? Try for a moment to envision how the angel looked ("like lightning," "clothing white as snow"). Why do you think these details were significant to Matthew?
- 5. Why do you think the angel told the women not to be afraid (who are not described in the text as being afraid) but did not speak to the guards (who are described as being extremely afraid)? What reason does the angel give the women for not being afraid ("Do not be afraid for . . .)?
- 6. What evidence does the angel give to the women to prove his claim that Jesus has risen? Why is this evidence important?
- 7. The angel said that Jesus had risen "just as He said." According to Matthew's gospel, what had Jesus said to the disciples concerning His death (see 16:21; 17:22-23; 20:17-19; and cf. 12:40)? Do you think the disciples should have expected the crucifixion and empty tomb? Would you have expected these events or would you be sharing the same confused emotions as the women at the tomb?
- 8. What major event is assumed but not described in these verses? Why do you think there was not an eyewitness to the actual, physical, bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ?
- 9. Since there was not an actual eyewitness to the resurrection, what evidence do you find in this passage that proves it to be true? Can you think of other passages of Scripture that stand as proof for the resurrection of Jesus Christ? What are they?
- 10. There are some people who have argued that the resurrection was nothing more than a lie manufactured by the disciples in order to hide the fact that Jesus did not actually rise from the dead so that they would be able to establish themselves as the leaders in this new movement. What would you say to someone who held this view?

04/19/17 John 20:19-31

- 1. What emotions were the disciples feeling before they saw Jesus? How did those change after they saw Jesus?
- 2. According to verse 19, why did the disciples still have the doors locked? How do you explain this in light of verses 8 & 9?
- 3. What makes Thomas' disbelieve of Jesus' resurrection so shocking? (Hint: What is significant about John introducing us to Thomas in John 11:16? What happens in chapter 11?)
- 4. We often refer to Thomas as Doubting Thomas. However, one of the first things Jesus did when He appeared to His disciples was to show them "his hands and side." Why do you think Jesus did this?
- 5. Mary was overcome with grief, the disciples with fear, and Thomas with doubt. What's one thing they all had in common before seeing Jesus?
- 6. What is their common response to seeing Jesus risen?
- 7. What does the resurrection of Jesus prove about what Jesus said about himself throughout the entire book of John?
- 8. Think back before you accepted Jesus as your savior. How would you have reacted had someone told you he saw someone raised from the dead?
- 9. In vv 19-23 what specific gifts and promises does Jesus give His disciples? Have we received the same gifts and promises? What do you think we are to do with them?
- 10. Why did John write the Book of John? (Hint: read verse 30-31)

04/26/17 Luke 24:13-35

- 1. What kind of things do you think these two disciples were talking about?
- 2. Why of all the disciples to visit on this first day of His resurrection, would he come alongside these two discouraged believers, and for it to be recorded for us?
- 3. Why would Jesus appear in a different form to these disciples? Why would He travel incognito?
- 4. Have you ever sensed an angel or the Lord Himself close to you
- 5. If Jesus were to walk alongside you today, what "heavy burdens" would you like Him to carry?
- 6. What value do you see in Jesus doing a bible study with them instead of just telling them who He was?
- 7. What stories from Israel's history do you think Jesus would have talked about?
- 8. On the road of life that you are on today, is the cause of Christ burning in your heart, or would you say that you need Jesus to come alongside and breathe His words upon the embers of your heart?
- 9. Why would Jesus act as if He was going further?
- 10. Why would Jesus disappear upon their recognition of Him?
