Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

September 20, 2017

I. Call to order

Chairperson Duane Wollenburg called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on September 20, 2017. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Duane Wollenburg, Lois Wattjes, Brian Scherling, Yvonne Rahe, Byron Beerenstrauch, Joel Kaelin and Amy Stokebrand

Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was reviewed. Lois made a motion and it was seconded by Byron that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of \$5,077.87 as of August 31, 2017. The available cash balance is \$3,640.86. Brian made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Yvonne. Motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance as of August 25, 2017 is \$40,592.37.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report.
- e) Memorial Report: The memorial balance is reported to be \$12,565.17 as of August 23, 2017.
- f) Suggestion Box: There was nothing to report.
- g) Committee Reports:
 - 1. Social Committee thought the combined congregational picnic and Sunday School kick off went over well. Will look at that again for next year.
 - 2. Worship Committee reported that they have developed a list of the top 100 hymns and will be focusing on those songs for the next year.
 - 3. Evangelical Committee reported that the 2nd quarter of Baptism Books were sent out to families.
 - 4. Parish Education nothing to report.
 - 5. Youth Group will meet for the first time this next Sunday. Pastor informed the council that there is a Youth Gathering every 3 years in a larger city where they can do a week of mission work. Next summer it will be in Houston, TX from June 27-July 1st. If the youth group is interested they would need to start fundraising right away for the trip.
 - 6. Property reported the garage siding project is complete. Brian will work on getting a quote from Travis Garrison for the parsonage pergola. He also informed the council that the air conditioning has been having problems. The fan motor was replaced a couple weeks ago but now the compressor is bad. Brian received quotes to fix the compressor and to replace the whole unit since it is 45 years old. The quote does not include electrical work. Brian will call the insurance company to see if our policy covers equipment failure. No action was taken until we have more information.

II. Old Business

- a) The Photo Directory was revisited to remind everyone to make their appointments to get their pictures taken soon.
- b) The council thought the meeting to address the survey went over well with the congregation asking many questions. A review will be done in 6 months to see how the changes have gone over.

III. New Business

- (a) Jana Muehling and Josi Hoesche visited about this years' Sunday school. There are 34-38 students enrolled. They wanted to know what was in the budget for Sunday school and Bible school expenses. They were asking for approval to plan fundraisers for Sunday school, Bible School and Care-A-Lot. Also next year's Bible school times was discussed because it was very hard this past year to get volunteers.
- (b) New Member Class will be meeting Sept. 29th, Oct 1st & 8th with the induction on the 15th. We have one new member with another possible family.
- (c) Pastor will be gone to a Theological Conference Sept. 26th and 27th.
- (d) Jackie Stejskal requests a release of membership and Amy Bowman requests a transfer of membership to another church because their families lives out the area. Brian made a motion and Joel seconded with the motion carried.
- (e) Pastor requested to go to a Barbershop Contest on October 20th-22nd in St. Louis that he is a member of. He will look into finding a supply Pastor for that Sunday.
- (f) Pastor reported that he has met with a Koenig/Flagor couple for marriage counseling and he will be officiating the ceremony on Nov. 11th at the church.
- (g) Pastor visited about the changes that have already been made with the hymns and the Narrative Lectionary. The changes will be easier to understand because they tell a story and don't jump around between the old and new testaments. He will still address the Advent Story during the Christmas season. He believes making these changes will be helpful for him to focus his sermon on one common idea instead of trying to tie in many different ideas.
- (h) Discussion was held about Offering Envelopes/Boxes. This next year, we will order 100 boxes.
- (i) The Immanuel Vision Foundation grant was turned over to Tim Garrison who is part of the DART Committee and they are interested in pursuing it.

There was a motion by Brian and a second by Yvonne to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. In conclusion of the meeting, the council recited the Lord's Prayer.

11-01-17 1 Kings 19:1-18

- 1. What types of things tend to get you down the most?
- 2. How does fear sometimes create depression
- 3. 1 Kings 19:3-5 illustrates four common contributors to depression: Elijah wore himself out, shut people out, focused on the negative and forgot the faithfulness of God. Of these four, which one is your most common challenge in your own life?
- 4. One of the most common factors that leads to depression is wearing ourselves out. In what areas of your life are you exhausted
- 5. The most spiritual thing we can do is rest. While that sounds so easy, why is it so hard for most of us to rest?
- 6. Do you think Elijah was justified in being discouraged by his circumstances?
- 7. Why do you think God revealed Himself to Elijah when the prophet was discouraged?
- 8. Do true Christians ever become depressed? If they do, is it a sign of unbelief or lack of faith? If they don't, is it a mark of righteousness or spiritual maturity?
- 9. Elijah had allowed his worries to drive him to places he should never have gone. What is the worst place that worrying has taken you?
- 10. When have you experienced God's faithfulness in helping you through past difficult circumstances?
