# Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

December 20, 2017

# I. Call to order

Chairperson Duane Wollenburg called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on December 20, 2017. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Brian Scherling, Joel Kaelin, Cody Wollenburg, Jesse Gronemeyer, and Lois Wattjes.

# Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was reviewed. Jesse made a motion and it was seconded by Brian that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of \$4,748.61 as of November 30, 2017. The available cash balance is \$4,673.61. Joel made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Cody. Motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance as of November 24, 2017 is \$42,513.62.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report.
- e) Memorial Report: No report.
- f) Suggestion Box: No report.
- g) Committee Reports:
  - 1. Social Committee had no report.
  - 2. Worship Committee is planning for the upcoming Christmas season.
  - 3. Evangelical Committee had no report.
  - 4. Parish Education/VBS had no report.
  - 5. Youth Group had no report.
  - 6. Property committee reported that there is a large branch broken off in a tree at the parsonage. Jesse volunteered to remove the branch at a later date. The Council will take down the Christmas tree at the front of the church after service on December 31<sup>st</sup>. Brian will be getting bids for the service work on the church air conditioning unit for the upcoming year.

# II. Old Business

- a) There was discussion on the replacement of the air conditioner. It was moved by Jesse and seconded by Lois to accept the bid from Beatrice Mechanical to replace the air conditioning unit for the church. The bid for the project was \$24,800. Insurance is covering the majority of the cost of the replacement. Motion carried.
- b) Liz is done taking family pictures for the photo directory. She will soon begin the final stages of completing the directory.
- c) The Council will take down the Christmas tree after church services on Sunday, December 31<sup>st</sup>.
- d) A new portable microphone was purchased for Pastor. A thank you goes out to Tim Garrison for helping find this affordable unit to purchase.

## III. New Business

- (a) WELCA would like to purchase 12 new round plastic tables for the fellowship hall to replace the existing wood rectangle tables. The topic was tabled until we get more information from WELCA concerning cost, upkeep, table coverings, etc.
- (b) Discussion was held about the Youth 2018 MSG which is the youth middle school gathering on January 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> in Omaha. A motion was made by Joel and seconded by Cody that the church pay a maximum total of \$325 for 12 students to attend the MSG. Motion passed. Van rental and gas will be donated by members of the council.
- (c) Annual Meeting Date will be Sunday, January 21st after church service. End of year church reports need to be submitted in early January.
- (d) Budget meeting will be the first week in January.
- (e) Motion was made by Joel and seconded by Brian to approve the transfer of memberships for Randy Wollenburg to St. Paul Lutheran Church and Jon Chavez to Christ Community Church in Beatrice. Motion carried. A motion was made by Lois and seconded by Jesse to approve the memberships of Danielle Block and son, Rylan Bergmeier, into Trinity Lutheran Church. Motion passed.
- (f) Reminder that year end reports are due in early January in preparation for the annual meeting.
- (g) The nominating committee will begin working on elections of council members for the upcoming annual meeting.
- (h) The next council meeting will be on Wednesday, January 24, 2018 at 8:00pm. This will be the first meeting for the newly elected council.

There was a motion by Jesse and a second by Cody to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. In conclusion of the meeting, the council recited the Lord's Prayer.

Bible Study Questions Wednesdays, 8:30 a.m. February 2018

### 02-07-18 John 9:1-41

- 1. The disciples drew a tight connection between blindness and sin. Where are they right? Where are they wrong?
- 2. Read Isaiah 29:18; 35:5; 42:7. Jesus healing of the blind man is a sign, but what does it point towards? What does v4 tell us about this healing and Jesus mission?
- 3. Why did 'they' bring the man who had been blind to the Pharisees?
- 4. In v16 we read that the Pharisees were divided. What was the issue that divided them?
- 5. Why do the Pharisees send for the man's parents? What testimony can they add? What does their evidence confirm?
- 6. V24 'We know this man (Jesus) is a sinner'. How do they know? By contrast, what does the blind man know?
- 7. Think of your life as a Christian. Where can you say I was \_\_\_\_\_\_ but now I \_\_\_\_\_? What is powerful about personal testimony? Do you feel comfortable / confident about speaking of the difference Jesus makes in your own life? Why / why not?
- 8. Why would the disciples prefer to remain 'disciples of Moses'? What have they missed? (read John 5:37-40; 45-47)
- 9. V 29 'as for this fellow, we don't even know where he comes from'. Jesus has come from Nazareth, but ultimately where has he come from? (5:36; 6:57; 8:16, 18, 42; 12:49; 13:3; 16:28; 17:5. 21, 24). What is the terrible irony in the Pharisee's complaint? What does it reveal?
- 10. Jesus has come into the world to save people, the light of salvation. Yet the religious leaders reject the light they refuse to see and so are blind. How are v35-41 like Proverbs 26:12?

## 02-14-18 John 11:1-44

- 1. Why did Jesus not rush to Lazarus when he heard we was ill?
- 2. How did Mary and Martha respond differently to Lazarus' death in their conversations with Jesus?
- 3. What made Jesus so emotional? (v. 33-35) If "deeply moved and greatly troubled" means that he was even angry, why would he react that way?
- 4. What did Jesus mean when he said to Mary "I am the resurrection and the life"?
- 5. What does Jesus do in verses 38-44 that give your confidence in him? (Hint: he gives commands.) How does Jesus authority translate into our hope?
- 6. How does someone who lives in denial respond to death? How does a sentimentalist respond to death? Why do people tend to respond in one of these two ways? How could you know if you are one of these?
- 7. It has been said "The worst part of hell is not suffering; it is the absence of hope." Why is hopelessness worse than suffering or even death?
- 8. Read 1 Thessalonians 4:13-14. How do grief and hope work together for those who have faith in Jesus?
- 9. Some commentators believe that the experience of Lazarus is also a picture of what happens to a person when he/she trusts Christ and is given new life. What might the grave clothes (v.44) represent? In your life? In the life of someone else? Where might Jesus be asking you to "take off the grave clothes and let him (her) go"?
- 10. How does the story of Lazarus' resurrection give you hope?

# 02-21-18 John 13:1-17

- 1. What does it mean to love someone to the end? Has someone shown you this kind of love in your life? Have you ever shown someone else this kind of love?
- 2. In what ways could you "love someone to the end" as you live your life?
- 3. What did Jesus know as he prepared to eat the Passover Meal with his disciples? Read John 13:1-3 & 11.
- 4. Does what Jesus did (serve the disciples), have a greater impact because of what Jesus knew beforehand?
- 5. If you knew that you had less than 24 hours left to live, would you choose to serve others?
- 6. Why didn't any of the disciples think to offer to wash feet? What were some of the other disciples doing during this meal? Read Luke 22:24.
- 7. What does it mean to have "a share with Jesus"? Does this mean that Christians are called to say what Jesus says, and do what Jesus does? Read John 13:12-15.
- 8. How does seeing Jesus serve and love his disciples help you to understand how you are called to serve and love people in your life?
- 9. Does this story about Jesus washing feet, and the humility that Jesus models, remind you of any other passages of Scripture about Jesus? Read Philippians 2:3-8. How are these passages similar?
- 10. Is Jesus leaving a command that we should wash feet, or is he teaching his disciples (and all followers) about something bigger than foot washing? If this is about something bigger, what is the bigger lesson Jesus is teaching?

# 02-28-18 John 18:12-27

- 1. What do the band of soldiers and those who came to Jesus at night do to him? Why do they bind him?
- 2. What had Caiaphas previously told the Jews concerning Jesus? Read John 11:49-53. Why did Caiaphas say what he did about Jesus?
- 3. When Jesus is led to the high priest's home, who follows him? Who is this unnamed disciple?
- 4. What is unique about the unnamed disciple that gives him the benefit of entering the courtyard of the high priest along with Jesus? Where was Peter?
- 5. What does the unnamed disciple do for Peter to give him a better view of what's going on with Jesus? Does this put the disciples at risk?
- 6. Re-read John 18:25-27. How many times does Peter deny Jesus? How does Mark's account of Peter's denial compare to John's account? Read Mark 14:66-72.
- 7. Peter denies Jesus while standing around a charcoal fire. What does Peter do while standing around another charcoal fire later in John's Gospel? Read John 21:9-17.
- 8. What does the tale of these two charcoal fires tell you about the grace of God to restore people?
- 9. How does Jesus respond to the question about his teaching? Why does Jesus tell Annas to ask those who heard him teach to witness about his teaching? Is it legal to ask the accused to testify against themself?
- 10. If you were watching this illegal court scene and watching Peter, a close friend of Jesus, deny Christ, how would you react? What would you conclude about Jesus and what he is going through?
