Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

July 18, 2018

I. Call to order

Chairperson Brian Scherling called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on July 18, 2018. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Brian Scherling, Mike Holtmeier, Yvonne Rahe, Nate Morrissey, Karen Wollenburg, Steve Garrison, Deb Schwan and Amy Stokebrand

Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was reviewed. Mike made a motion and it was seconded by Deb that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of \$4,883.58 as of June 30, 2018 with available cash of \$3,792.27. Mike made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Yvonne. Motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance as of June 29th, 2018 was \$53,207.07.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report. We will start putting birthday announcements in the bulletin each week. Visited about the Immanuel Vision Foundation Grant Application. Pastor will pass on to the Teammates organization. Pastor will donate his time to paint a mural or put up wallpaper on the wall of the nursery. He reported that the congregation seems to be enjoying the Friday reflections so he will continue doing. The children that attended Camp Joy Holling will present to the congregation sometime in August or September. Pastor will be gone the week of July 22-26th for confirmation camp at Carol Joy Holling.
- e) Memorial Report: The memorial balance was reported to be \$18,579.24.
- f) Suggestion Box: No report.
- g) Committee Reports
 - 1. Social Committee reported that Sunday School Kick Off will be Sept 9th with a picnic after the service.
 - 2. Worship Committee reported that Praise Service will be August 12th. They suggested that we have special services in the months there are 5 Sundays such as youth led service, men/women led service, and pot lucks afterwards. They are looking at ideas for Lenten services this year like changing start time. Suggested going back to having communion in the front pews like we once did it.
 - 3. Evangelical Committee reported that Yvonne will send out a thank you to guests that attend church services. We will move the guest book into the sanctuary so it is more visible for guests to sign. We would like the Ushers to remind guests to sign the welcome book.
 - Parish Education/VBS visited about the Sunday School Kick Off meal after service. They
 asked that the Christmas Program be moved to Dec. 16th instead of the Sunday before
 Christmas.
 - 5. Youth Group had nothing to report.
 - 6. Confirmation Committee reported that they had met with Pastor to get ideas for changing the confirmation classes and they will continue to meet in the upcoming months. Liz Poessnecker is also on the committee. They are looking at new books and developing mentors for each students. They would like to see more accountability for each student.
 - 7. Property committee reported that the sprinklers will get fixed and discussed the landscaping project to get the water to drain away from the north side of the church.

II. Old Business

- We heard an update on the church newsletter. Only 25 copies were sent out this past month.
- b) The insurance premium was going increase for the upcoming year but a committee looked at our policy and discussed changes and we were able to save money instead.
- c) Brian reminded the council about the goals we had set for the year with 6 months left in the year: Watch expenses, revamp confirmation, and look at ways to share resources with other churches.

III. New Business

- a) Mike made a motion to work on the landscaping project on the north side of the church to fix the water drainage problem for about \$850 out of the capital improvement fund. Steve seconded it and motion approved.
- b) Karen made a motion to change the locks of the 3 main doors so they all match for a total of \$135. Nate made a second and the motion carried.
- c) Discussed paying the first half of the Benevolence which would be about \$5500. Discussion tabled until next meeting.
- d) Discussed the wedding policies concerning confetti and glitter in the church and outside. Will table the discussion to see what our policies consist of.
- e) Discussed possible fundraising events to go towards the general fund. Ideas were hosting a golf tournament and silent auction.

There was a motion by Mike and a second by Steve to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. The next meeting will be August 15th at 8:00pm. In conclusion of the meeting, the council recited the Lord's Prayer.

Bible Study Questions Wednesdays, 8:30 a.m. September 2018

09-05-18 Genesis 6:5-22; 8:6-12; 9:8-17

- 1. How does the description of Noah and his sons differ from the descriptions found in 6:1-7, and why is the character of these men important to know at this juncture of the story?
- 2. Why has "all flesh" become wicked & completely evil (6:5), corrupt (6:11), and violent (6:14)?
- 3. What do you think it was like for Noah during these days in which "he did all that God commanded him" (6:22)?
- 4. What did God "remember" about Noah and the others in the ark that caused Him to end the flood?
- 5. What similarities do you find between Genesis 8 and Genesis 1, and what does this teach you about God's intentions for the inhabitants of the ark?
- 6. Why is Moses so specific concerning the length of time for each event in the flood (i.e. 40 days & nights of flooding, 150 days of the flood prevailing, 150 days of the flood abating, etc.)?
- 7. Since the moral state of man was the same after the flood as before (cf. 8:21 with 6:5), why did God promise never again to cut off all flesh or destroy the earth by flood (8:21-22, 9:11)?
- 8. In what ways does Noah resemble Adam, and how does this inform you about Noah's role in God's promise (Gen. 3:15)?
- 9. What do you learn in these chapters about God's view of sin?
- 10. Why is the story of Noah, the flood, and God's covenant with Noah important to you today, and how does it strengthen your faith, your view of God, and your hope for the future?

09-12-18 Genesis 12:1-9

- 1. Why do you think God didn't tell Abram up front where he would be going?
- 2. Why do you think God didn't extend the invitation to the entire family Abram's father and brothers included?
- 3. In what ways is this very first experience between God and Abram representative of everyone's experience with God throughout history?
- 4. In what ways can you relate to Abram's calling?
- 5. In Genesis 3, God exiled Adam and Eve from Eden, multiplied the pain of childbirth, cursed the ground so that it would produce food only through hard labor, and subjected human beings to death. How do God's promises to Abram in (Gen. 12:1-3) begin to address the components of the curse in a positive way? How do the promises to Abram begin to foreshadow redemption?
- 6. List the promises made to Abram in (Gen. 12:2-3, 7). How many of them did Abram get to experience to some degree in his lifetime?
- 7. Did his "waiting" dissolve his faith? Look up (Heb. 11:13; Rom. 4:17-22). What effect has waiting had on your faith in the past? What can we learn from the verses listed above about faith that endures the wait?
- 8. Why is it significant that the Lord gave his promises in (Gen. 12:2-3, 7) without conditions?
- 9. The people destroyed in the Flood were noted in (Gen. 6:4) as "men of renown" (lit. "men of a name"). The people of Babel were destroyed for trying to make a name for themselves (Gen. 11:4). According to God's promise in (Gen. 12:2), how was Abram going to be different?
- 10. What can we learn about Abram's character from his actions in (Gen. 12:4-9)? List the qualities you observe and how he shows them (See Hebrews 11:8-10 for examples).

09-19-18 Genesis 39:1-23

- 1. Why was such a fuss made over the "varicolored tunic" (Gen. 37:3) which Joseph's father had given him?
- 2. Why was such a fuss made over Joseph's dream? (Gen. 37:5)
- 3. What is the stark contrast between Joseph and his master's wife when it comes to their earthly master?
- 4. What is the stark contrast between Joseph and his master's wife when it comes to their heavenly master?
- 5. So how would you characterize this test? (Potiphar's wife)
- 6. How did Joseph pass this test?
- 7. Joseph was obviously in control of his appetites, for he avoided committing sin when there was opportunity. What else is implied as being under Joseph's control by the manner in which Joseph responded to the false charges against him?
- 8. So what actually happens to Joseph from a career point of view?
- 9. Obviously suffering is never enjoyable, but what might be the important lessons learned from it?
- 10. What do we know spiritual suffering to eventually turn into?

09-26-18 Exodus 14:5-7, 10-14, 21-29

- 1. Describe what it must have been like to have the Red Sea in front of you and Pharaoh's soldiers coming up from behind. What would you have said to Moses under the same circumstances?
- 2. Describe Pharaoh and his officials' attitudes in your own words. Why do you think they didn't seem to care about all the plagues that had come on them? What does this tell us about sin and our minds?
- 3. How did the Israelites feel when they saw the Egyptians? How would you describe their faith?
- 4. Why do you think their faith was so weak even though they saw so many miracles? What does this tell you about people in general? Do you think most people today are like the Israelites then?
- 5. Did Moses talk with God before or after reassuring the people? If he didn't talk to God yet, how did he know that God would fight for them and they would never see the Egyptians again? What does this show us about Moses' faith?
- 6. If an unbeliever asked you why God would want to exact further judgment on the Egyptians even when the Israelites were already gone, what would you say?
- 7. Throughout this encounter with the Egyptians what does Moses do? What does God do?
- 8. What are ways you help yourself remember God's faithfulness to you in the past? What are ways you could help yourself trust God for the future?
- 9. After the Lord saved Israel from the hand of the Egyptians, how did the people react toward the Lord and Moses?
- 10. What lessons can we learn from this event, crossing the Red Sea?



What is WELCA?
Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

- Every confirmed woman is a member of WELCA even if she is not actively involved in the circles or the board. WELCA operates on a local, cluster, synod and national level.
- The current WELCA board has members who are both active and not active in circles.
- Every woman in the church is eligible to vote for the WELCA board.

What does the local WELCA do?

- WELCA supports the local church and charities through offerings and gifts.
- WELCA is in charge of and financially supports the kitchen. Effort is made to keep the costs as low as possible.
- If you drank a cup of coffee before church, WELCA bought the cup, the coffee, and the sugar and cream.
- If you washed a dish in the kitchen, WELCA bought the soap and the faucet.
- If you used a roaster, WELCA bought it.
- If you put something in the refrigerator in the kitchen or the Care-a-lot room, WELCA bought the refrigerator. Oh yes, they bought the stove, too.
- WELCA arranges the Service Groups which provide food and help for many events including funerals and church events including the Christmas Program Soup Supper.
- WELCA collects, sorts, packs, and delivers Lutheran World Relief kits, including school, personal care, and baby care.
- WELCA helps plan and participates in World Day of Prayer.

How is WELCA funded?

- There are two active circles. They have monthly Bible studies, complete service projects, and support one another and others in many ways including prayers partners and prayer chains.
- Circle offerings are split two ways. One third is kept by the circle for special projects. Two thirds goes to the general treasury. A portion of the offering is forward to another level of WELCA.
- A large portion of WELCA funds come from the offerings of about 20 women in the congregation.
- Donations are received from funerals and events, but the sandwich fixings are paid for by WELCA as are drink supplies and paper products.
