Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

August 15, 2018

I. Call to order

Chairperson Brian Scherling called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on August 15, 2018. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Brian Scherling, Mike Holtmeier, Yvonne Rahe, Nate Morrissey, Karen Wollenburg, Steve Garrison and Amy Stokebrand

Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was reviewed. Mike made a motion and it was seconded by Yvonne that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of -\$408.63 as of July 31, 2018 with available cash of -\$528.63. Brian explained there was an error in reading the balance when \$1500 was moved back into the Property Fund at the end of the month so the account was on hold for a couple of days but no fees were accrued and we now have a positive balance. Nate made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Karen. Motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance as of July 27th, 2018 was \$54,462.26.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report. The youth members that attended Camp Joy Holling will give an appreciative presentation to the congregation on September 23rd during worship service. Pastor has been serving on the NE Lutheran Camp Ministry for 2 years at SCC in Beatrice. The group is looking at a venue to hold a potluck fundraiser. Pastor will get more details before anything is decided. Pastor is working with an individual to design the power point slides that are used during worship service. Please give him feedback on what you think. Pastor has signed up to be a mentor with the Teammates program at Tri County. The Beatrice Teen & Adult Challenge is asking for a donation. Pastor will find out more details on what they are needing.
- e) Memorial Report: There was no report.
- f) Suggestion Box: No report.
- g) Committee Reports
 - 1. Social Committee reported that Sunday School Kick Off will be Sept 9th with a picnic after the service and a Silent Auction for unwanted items in the church.
 - Worship Committee reported that Praise Service will be September 2nd. During the Sunday School Kick Off worship service, bibles will be given out and teachers will be introduced. Looking at ideas for Advent with area churches. Pastor will be gone Dec. 30th so there will be a Hymnfest that Sunday.
 - 3. Evangelical Committee reported that a thank you will be sent out to guests that attend church services.
 - Parish Education/VBS visited about the Sunday School Kick Off meal after service on Sept. 9th.
 - 5. Youth Group had nothing to report.
 - 6. Property committee reported that the sprinklers will be fixed for the church and parsonage. May need to reseed some parts of the grass. We will be working on the drainage problem at the front of the church on Sept. 3rd at 8:00 am. The cross out front is not lit up and the marquee sign is not working either so that will be looked into. Locks were replaced so they all match.

II. Old Business

- We will wait to pay the Benevolence till the end of the year.
- b. The policy was reviewed for holding weddings at the church and it seems to up to date so no action was taken
- c. Karen reported that WELCA will purchase 12 white round tables from Costco for the fellowship hall. They will look at trying to sell some of the older tables with the money going back to WELCA. In the future, they may look at replacing chairs. They would like to put out a donation basket during the upcoming Sundays with the money going back to the treasury to fund their expenses and projects.

III. New Business

- a) A confirmation committee was discussed to have guidelines set up for the confirmation classes such as requirements and attendance policies in order to be confirmed. Mike made a motion to set up a confirmation committee with Karen seconding it. Motion passed.
- b) Discussed a Mentor program for the confirmations students to visit monthly with each other. Karen made a motion. Nate seconded and the motion passed.
- c) We are looking at new materials for the confirmation students and the 5-6th grade Sunday School classes that include new bibles and study guides. Mike made a motion to purchase the materials at about \$885 from the Memorial Fund. Yvonne seconded it and the motion carried.
- d) Discussed purchasing new first grade bibles that are easier to understand for the students. Mike made a motion to purchase the materials from the Memorial Fund at a total of \$250. Nate seconded it and the motion passed.
- e) Pastor brought up that doors in the parsonage laundry room are not shutting. Mike will look into it.

There was a motion by Mike and a second by Karen to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. The next meeting will be Sept. 19th at 8:00pm. In conclusion of the meeting, the council recited the Lord's Prayer.

Bible Study Questions Wednesdays, 8:30 a.m. October 2018

10-03-18 Exodus 19:3-7; 20:1-17

- 1. What has God done for Israel so far? Why does God tell Moses to remind the people of this (v.4)?

- 7. Why is the first commandment so critical? How do we run the risk of having other gods?
- 8. What would be a modern way of expressing a Sabbath? Do you think this is relevant today? Why?
- 9. How by keeping the commandments can we be distinctive for God's glory? Try to think of a different commandment each, and how this might be manifested in your workplace/school/university/club.
- 10. Why are the commands an important source of freedom, community, and love?

10-10-18 Joshua 24:1-26

- 1. Write down what you learn about Abraham in the following verses: Genesis 12:1-3; Genesis 15:1-7; Hebrews 11:8-12. Why did God choose Abraham to become the father of the nation of God's people?
- 2. Joshua was speaking in first person on behalf of the LORD in verses 2-13. What is significant about the number of times the word "I" is used?
- 3. In verse 15, Joshua told Israel, "Choose this day whom you will serve... But as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD." What do you think Joshua meant by this statement? Explain how he seemed to be speaking on behalf of his entire family.
- 4. What events does God, through Joshua, recount to the people of Israel in these verses? Why might they have needed to be reminded of these events?

- 9. How did Joshua's public stand influence the people's response (vv. 16-18)? What kind of example had Joshua set for them?
- 10. Why does God require an absolute commitment, not just a hasty or arbitrary one? Why are high standards an essential part of making courageous choices?


