Greetings from your pastor and partner in ministry!!

It's the start of a new year and I think it's always a good to reflect on our shared ministry of the prior year and look forward to the planned shared ministry of the year ahead. Last year was a full year, at least according to the numbers. Together we celebrated the union of 5 couples (Wollenburg, Hardin, Van Buren, Oliver, Remmers) through holy matrimony, entrusted the souls of 8 members and non-members (Goodwin, Pieper, Stokebrand, Scherling, Miller, Koch, Wollenburg, Garrison) to our Lord, and welcomed 7 young and old people alike (Rowden, Miller, Hopkins, Remmers, Oliver, Pieper, Tietjen) to the body of Christ through the baptismal waters. We were unable to attract any new members unless you consider the newly married non-members as "members through marriage," which I happen to regard them. So we actually gained 5 new members through marriage which means we lost 8 but gained 12 members. We didn't confirm any of our youth but we made some great improvements to the program in curriculum and overall structure. 3 of our young ones received communion for the first time while another 9 received their first Bible. Our Vacation Bible School attracted over 60 kids from the community and our Sunday school classes continue to grow in size. Pretty awesome year!

Looking at the year ahead, we've got much to look forward to. We currently have 4 weddings scheduled in Feb (Jameson/Wollenburg), June (Hubbert/Holtmeier and Barnts/Howell) and July (Thernes/Barnard)...4 new members! In April, 5 of our young ones will receive their first communion while 5 more will receive their first Bibles. 11 of our youth have been graciously adaptable to all the changes we've made with the confirmation program last year and I look forward to confirming all of them at the end of April. In the fall, 3 of our youth will begin the new and improved confirmation program. God only knows who we'll lose or gain but I'm excited for all the growth in faith of our members. I can only assume our Vacation Bible School will again be amazing and our Sunday school program will remain strong. Thank you to everyone, members and non-members alike, for helping make our shared ministry together so rich and rewarding!

Trinity Lutheran Church Minutes

November 14, 2018

I. Call to order

Chairperson Brian Scherling called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on November 14, 2018. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Brian Scherling, Mike Holtmeier, Steve Garrison, Karen Wollenburg, Yvonne Rahe, Deb Schwan and Amy Stokebrand

Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was reviewed. Mike made a motion and it was seconded by Karen that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a reconciled and available cash balance of \$3,845.17 as of October 31, 2018. Steve made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Yvonne. Motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The investment balance as of October 26, 2018 was \$50,447.49.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report. Pastor's vacation will be November 19-25th. The 2019 Middle School Gathering is Jan. 19 & 20th for confirmation.
- e) Memorial Report: There was no report.
- f) Suggestion Box: There was nothing to report.
- g) Committee Reports
 1. Social Committee had nothing to report.
 2. Worship Committee reported that they will be doing Advent Surprises each Sunday such as coffee & cookies and crafts. Still trying to finalize each week.
 3. Evangelical Committee sent out thank you's for visitors.
 4. Parish Education/VBS will purchase gifts for the Sunday School kids for Christmas.
 5. Youth Group reported that Pie Sales will be ending soon with delivery the next week. They will be going to the People's City Mission in December to serve.
 6. Confirmation Committee will be having a meeting soon to see how the year is going.
 7. Property committee reported that Richters Heating & Air came to do the Bi-annual checkup and 3 of the 4 roof top furnaces were not working so they were fixed at a cost of \$3,003. Plymouth Electric came to look at the control panel for the Bell Tower but they cannot fix it so it will have to be replaced. We received a quote from another company that specializes in Bell Towers. The first option is to fix the Tower so the bells continue to ring at a cost of \$6-7,000 plus the cost of installing a new control panel for \$1,500. The other option is to fix the Bell Tower so the bells and music play again and that would be about \$20,000. Our insurance deductible is \$5,000 so then insurance would cover the rest if we filed a claim. Mike received a quote on how much it would cost to put a stairlift to the balcony and it would be \$5-6,000. We will look into this project down the road.

II. Old Business

- a) We will look into our policies for when there are weddings held at the church and what the cleanup protocol is.
- b) Brian will visit with Pastor for his six month review.

III. New Business

- a) The church's Windows computer program is up for renewal for \$399 per year. Mike made a motion and Deb seconded to renew for the next year. Motion carried.
- b) Steve made a motion that the loose offering collected during the first 2 Sundays of Advent will go towards the Christmas sacks for the kids. Yvonne seconded it and the motion carried.
- c) Collections for Pastor's Christmas Gift will be taken until December 21st.
- d) Brian and Bobbie will host the Council's December meeting and Christmas party at their home on December 19th at 7:00pm.
- e) Children's Christmas Program will be December 16th at 5:30pm. Communion Worship Service will be December 23rd. Christmas Eve service will be at 6:00pm and Christmas Day Service with communion at 10:00am. Hymn Fest will be December 30th at 10:00am since Pastor will be gone.
- f) The Council discussed the possibility of buying an artificial tree in the future. It will be discussed with the congregation.
- g) The Usher/Greeter signup sheet will be put out for members to sign up for the month they prefer.
- h) The Bell Tower project was discussed again that we would just fix the bells and not the music. Mike made a motion to fund the deductible of the Bell Tower with Memorial Funds. Karen seconded it and the motion carried.

There was a motion by Mike and a second by Steve to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. The next meeting will be December 19th at 7:00. In conclusion of the meeting, the council recited the Lord's Prayer.

NO BIBLE STUDY!!

01-09-19 Matthew 3:1-17

1. "The Kingdom of Heaven is here." This phrase is found in Matthew. Luke and Mark refer to the "Kingdom of God". "Heaven is a substitute for the name of "God". Jews avoided the use of the name of God out of reverence. Should we avoid the name of God?
2. The idea of God's Kingdom is central to the teaching of Jesus and is mentioned 50 times in Matthew alone. What did it mean to those who heard it at that time? What do you understand it to be? How is God's rule evident today?
3. Read the accounts in Mark 1:1-11 and Luke 3:1-22 and compare with Matthew. What are some similarities and some differences between recordings?
4. John the Baptist was another fulfillment of a prophecy in the O.T. (See Isaiah 40:3). How did John the Baptist "prepare the way for the Lord?" and "make straight paths for him"?
5. Who was supposed to come before the Messiah? – see Malachi 4: 5,
6. Who did Jesus say John the Baptist was? – See Matthew 17: 11-13.
7. What did John say about himself? See John 1: 21 – 27.
8. Why did Jesus want to be baptized by John, since John's baptism was for the repentance of sins? See II Corinthians 5:21.
9. How does John the Baptist mark the end of an era? What is the new era?
10. Verse 16. Jesus was equipped for his ministry with the Holy Spirit. Did Jesus not have the Holy Spirit before this event?

01-16-19 Matthew 4:1-17

1. How is temptation a struggle for us all? Have you had specific times during which temptation was more of a problem? Without necessarily sharing the details, why was this the case and how did you respond to it?
2. How do you see the baptism of Jesus (especially the declaration of his sonship) and his temptation in the wilderness linked? In what way is the Holy Spirit involved in both?
3. Do you think it is true that where there is spiritual baptism that there is also spiritual battle? Do you have an examples that you could share?
4. What is temptation? How would you describe it simply to a child or someone who isn't a Christian?
5. In what way was the temptation in the wilderness a test of Jesus' vocation? How is it a test of our vocations as Christians?
6. Is being tempted a sin?
7. When identifying the enemy – the devil – how dangerous is it to either over-believe or underbelieve in his existence?
8. How does Jesus' time of testing compare to that of Israel in the wilderness (you may wish to have a look at Deuteronomy 8:5)?
9. Reading verses 3-9 again, identify as a group the three key ways in which the devil tempted Jesus. What is at the heart of each of these temptations?
10. Identify as a group how Jesus responded to each of the temptations. Identify and discuss each of the Scriptures that he quotes to the devil.

01-23-19 Matthew 5:1-20

1. Each beatitude consists of two parts. What are these parts? Do ALL the consequences come to all those considered blessed? Or does a particular consequence follow a particular characteristic?
2. What does it mean "to be blessed"? Look up the word "bless" in an English dictionary.
3. Why is it necessary to be aware of your spiritual poverty before you can become a Christian?
4. Is the Kingdom a geographic empire or the sphere of God's reign? What trouble would a proud person have submitting to a reign?
5. How does this sort of gentleness contrast with the world's ideal? How is humility important to Christlikeness?
6. How can an intense desire for righteousness put you at odds with the world? What sort of righteousness is Jesus talking about, do you think? What promise are we given?
7. According to 5:7 and 6:14-15, will God be merciful to us if we don't show mercy? Why or why not, do you think? How does mercy agree with or run counter to the world's standards?
8. WHY can people with a pure heart see, know, and discern God? Why can't "chronic" sinners see God? How do we obtain the pure or clean heart that Jesus describes?
9. In what way was Jesus a peacemaker? In what ways can we be peacemakers? Why is peacemaking so God-like that those who practice it are termed "sons of God"?
10. Why do you think Jesus made each of these Beatitudes a paradox?

01-30-19 Matthew 6:7-34

1. In 6:7-8, Jesus again issues a positive and a negative command. What are they?
2. If, as 6:8 states, God knows what you need before you ask Him, why should you ask Him at all?
3. Does Jesus intend the prayer in verses 9-13 to be a prayer that we repeat word for word when it's time to pray? Or did He give it as a model prayer that serves as a pattern for our prayers?
4. What is the significance of Jesus teaching us to pray to God as our Father? Why does He mention "who is in heaven"?
5. How does one store up treasures in heaven? What advantage does this have over accumulating earthly possessions?
6. How can you tell what your heart treasures the most?
7. How many times in this passage are we told not to worry or be anxious?
8. In verses 25-30, Jesus talks about food and clothing. What is the point that He is making?
9. Jesus compares worry to "little faith". What are some ways that worry undermines faith, specifically in the area of making a living and paying the bills?
10. The things a person worries about reveal something about that person. What?

January 6 is Epiphany which traditionally celebrates the coming of the wisemen. The paramounts are white which is the color of innocence and holiness. The banner which reads Your Light Has Come features the gifts of the Magi. The flowers represent the plants which produce the frankincense and myrrh. The gold represents the gift of gold.

January 13 is the Baptism of Our Lord Sunday. The white paramounts reflect the innocence and holiness of Jesus.

January 20 is the 2nd Sunday of Epiphany. The paramounts are now green, the color of growth. Epiphany's message is Christ's revelation to the Gentiles, thus the use of green-the color symbolic of growth. If you haven't done so, take a few minutes after the service and take a close look at the paramounts and notice the symbols of growth.

January 27 is the 3rd Sunday of Epiphany. The green paramounts remind us that our faith grows even in the midst of winter.
