February 20, 2019

I. Call to order

Chairperson Mike Holtmeier called to order the regular meeting of the Trinity Lutheran Church Council on February 20, 2019. Pastor Koos led the group in devotions. Members in attendance were Pastor Koos, Steve Garrison, , Karen Wollenburg, Tim Garrison, Brian Smidt, Lana Hager, Nate Morrissey, Deb Schwan, and Jane Stokebrand. Also, in attendance were confirmation students McKenzie Smith, Gage Heller, Evelyn Baker, and Jackson Kirchoff.

Reports

- a) Secretary's Report: A copy of the previous minutes was reviewed. Tim made a motion and it was seconded by Steve that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.
- b) Treasurer's Report: A copy of the monthly treasurer's report indicated a balance of \$8,256.16. Nate made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Karen. Motion carried.
- c) Investments Report: The balance was reported at \$51,178.49 as of January 31, 2019. Tim reported that he has an appointment with a representative of Edward James Investments to review the account on February 22st of this month.
- d) Pastor's Report: See included report. Pastor presented a request for transfer for Jim Workman who has moved to Texas. The transfer is requested to Our Savior Lutheran Church of McCallen, Texas. There was a motion by Tim and a second by Nate to approve the transfer. The motion carried. Pastor reported that he will be attending the Rural Ministry Conference March 3rd through 5th, and the First Communion Class for fifth graders will begin March 10th and will continue for a total of 5 weeks. Pastor also noted that there appears to be a need to assist supply pastors as they acclimate to our church. Following discussion it was determined that the head usher would perform that duty.
- e) Memorial Report: The balance was reported at \$17,892.31 as of January 31, 2019. Nate offered to serve on the Memorial Committee.
- f) Suggestion Box: There was nothing to report.
- g) Committee
 - 1. Spiritual Life and Growth
 - a) Social Committee had nothing to report.
 - b) Worship Committee: Karen reported the Narrative Lectionary service will be continued, and that Lenten services will begin Ash Wednesday to be followed by weekly Lenten Services preceded by a light meal. Karen also reported that a "noisy offering" will be March 3rd allowing children to present a coin offering.
 - c) Evangelical/Stewardship Committee had nothing to report.
 - 2. Youth Development
 - a) Parish Ed/VBS: Mike reported VBS will be held the first full week in June to be provided by counselors from Camp Joy Holling. It consist of 4 days from 9:00 A.M. to 2:0
 - b) Youth Group Committee: It was reported the room for youth group is currently being repainted.
 - c) Confirmation: Confirmation students are being exposed to the workings of the church by engaging in a council meeting and having presentations by variations organizations in the church.
 - 3. Care, Management and Overview

a) Property: This last month has consisted primarily of snow removal. A thank you is extended to Ron Wollenburg for his continued assistance with this project. The bell tower is expected to be repaired in February or March, and Pardes will be contacted to see if they wish to continue mowing the church lawn.

Bible Study Questions Wednesdays, 8:30 a.m. April 2019

04-03-19 Matthew 25:31-46

- 1. This is a hard passage for a lot of people. How about you? Is there anything about the Parable of the Sheep and Goats that troubles you?
- 2. Whatever else this passage means, it plainly teaches that a day is coming when the Son of Man, pictured as a glorious Shepherd-King in this parable, will judge "the nations." What do you believe about this? Do you believe that history is headed toward a climactic, inescapable, conclusive day of judgment?
- 3. How much or little does this coming judgment figure into the way you live from day to day? Are you at all concerned or apprehensive about this day of judgment? Why or why not?
- 4. Who are the people gathered before Jesus in the final judgement pictured by this parable?
- 5. Similarly, who are the hungry, thirsty, naked, strange, sick, imprisoned people who have either been helped or not helped?
- 6. Matthew 10:40-42 and 12:46-50. Do those passages help us to identify those who were either helped (by the "sheep") or not helped ("by the goats")? How?
- 7. On what basis does the Son of Man divide those gathered before him into sheep and goats? What's the destiny of each? How does each group stand in relationship to Jesus?
- 8. Read James 2:14-18. How does it help us to understand the judgment that's pictured in this parable?
- 9. Some contend that this parable teaches that our eternal destinies depends on "good works" as represented by the different responses to the needs of those whom Jesus calls, "my brothers." Is there anything in the text which suggests otherwise?
- 10. What do you make of the fact that both the sheep and the goats express surprise about the standard by which they've been judged? How do you explain their surprise?

04-10-19 Matthew 21:1-17

- 1. Read Zech. 14:1-4 & Ps. 48:1-3. Picture yourself as a devout Jew living in Jesus' day, a Jew who knew the Scriptures well (including Zech. 14 & Ps. 48). What significance would you attach to Jesus, who "drew near to Jerusalem and came . . . to the Mount of Olives" (Matt. 21:1)?
- 2. How did Jesus know that the animals would be just inside the village? Did He exercise His omniscience (complete knowledge of everything) or did He prearrange to have the animals ready for His need?
- 3. If you were one of the disciples Jesus sent to get the animals, what would you have been talking about on the way into town?
- 4. Read Zech. 9:1-10. According to Matt. 21:4 why was it necessary to procure the colt & donkey?
- 5. Zech. 9:1-7 gives us a list of Israel's enemies that God will judge. We will focus on vs. 8-10. What is prophesied in v. 8 concerning God's actions on behalf of His people? To what does "my house" refer? 6. In v. 9, what are God's people commanded to do? What characteristics are we given of this king over
- whom the people should rejoice? How will this king come to the people according to v. 9? What does God promise he will do in v. 10?
- 7. Picture yourself again as the devout Jew who was watching the events in Matt. 21:1-11 unfold, a Jew who knew well the prophesy found in Zech. 9. What would you be expecting this King to do?
- 8. Why did the crowd spread their cloaks on the road for the animals and Jesus to walk upon (cf. 2 Kings 9:12-13)? What three phrases did the crowds shout? The word "hosanna" means "save, now!" or "O save!" Were the crowds correct in their praise? From what were the crowds asking to be saved?
- 9. When the crowds shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" what were they acknowledging about Christ? Were they correct in their praise? Do you think everyone in the crowd was a true worshiper of Christ? Why or why not?

10. Who is in control of every aspect of these events? Why do you think Jesus allowed this kind of worship and public announcing of Himself as the Messiah to happen when he had stopped it so many times before (e.g. Matt. 9:27-31; John 2:4; 7:30; 8:20; 12:23, 27; 13:1; 17:1)?

04-17-19 Matthew 28:1-10

- 1. Why do you think only the women came early to the tomb? What emotions do you think they were feeling as they walked? How would you have felt if you were with them?
- 2. The Scriptures are clear that the women were at the tomb early, and the men were not. Should the men have been there? Why or why not?
- 3. What is significant about this angel appearing to the women at the empty tomb?
- 4. The Bible says the women left the tomb and ran with a mixture of fear and joy. What does this image mean to you?
- 5. The women have an encounter with Jesus after his resurrection. What is their initial response? What can we learn from their example?
- 6. Why do you think that Jesus told the women to not be afraid?
- 7. The resurrection of Jesus is the most important fact of the Christian faith. Why?
- 8. How does the resurrection of Jesus give us hope for today and for all eternity?
- 9. What major event is assumed but not described in these verses? Why do you think there was not an eyewitness to the actual, physical, bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ?
- 10. Since there was not an actual eyewitness to the resurrection, what evidence do you find in this passage that proves it to be true? Can you think of other passages of Scripture that stand as proof for the resurrection of Jesus Christ?

04-28-19 Matthew 28:16-20

- 1. How do the eleven respond to Jesus when they see him on the mountain? How does this comfort us in our faith journeys?
- 2. What does Jesus do to comfort his followers?
- 3. In Daniel 7:13-14, what authority has been given to Jesus?
- 4. How does the authority of Christ give us confidence in our own life and ministry?
- 5. If Jesus's command to "make disciples" can be broken into three parts (make, mature, multiply), where do we see this reflected in the verse?
- 6. Why don't we need to be afraid of this Great Commission?
- 7. What are 3 important truths about being a disciple from verses 16 and 17?
- 8. In verse 17, what were some of the disciples doubting? How are Jesus' next words an antidote to this doubt?
- 9. In the passage, how are the great commission and authority connected?
- 10. In what way is Jesus always present with us?
